Ultimately the governing board is the responsible party for the direction of VCAS and only the board with of course the voters and the community being the final say in the end. No kill (without the Mickey Mouse math) is totally achievable and in fact for years under Tara Diller it was no kill as there was always a solution, working with rescues not only in ventura county but other areas is a must, the reliance of volunteers is a must, spaying and neutering is a must as the law of supply and demand comes into play. There has to be the stopping of breeding in fact Big Bear is entertaining an ordinance that no breeding will be tolerated and the state is looking to fund more and more spay and neuters in the state (they have already committed 50 million which any shelter can apply for funds) as the state recognizes this is the answer to over population.

We have a state law to help stop breeding Bella's act AB2152 is in effect but it must be implemented to be effective. Monies should be allocated for free or low cost spaying and neutering, a liaison (such as your past person Jane) needs to be reinstated as that woman moved a lot of animals.
Clearly, this is a complicated issue but when you have years of no kill and then

suddenly gradually the killing starts again , then of course there are those who are upset and why not? If it could be done for years , then why not now? That's because there was an extremely supportive board for no kill with Steve Bennett being a strong proponent.
