I live at 1851 Brittany Park Rd, Camarillo, CA 93012. I viewed the maps about a month ago and again today. I see that many of the lines that originally effected our valley seem to have been re-drawn and I applaud that. Based on the map the corridor still runs right along the back line of our property and shows a surface water feature touching our property. According to the revised proposed ordinance a surface water feature is defined as:

Surface Water Feature. An area containing a stream, (including intermittent and ephemeral), creek, river, wetland, seep, or pond,.... The term surface water feature does not include ponds, lakes, marshes, wetlands or agricultural water impediments or associated riparian habitat areas that are legally established and human-made.

There is no such surface water feature behind my lot. There is a man-made drainage ditch that only has water in when we receive a large amount of rain to help channel the water to the arroyo to prevent flooding.

The marking of the surface water feature should be removed as it is not accurate and the 100 foot buffer associated with it imposes restrictions that were not in place when we purchased this property. These restrictions impede plans we have for our lot and negatively impact our property value.

I am writing to express my support for the proposed Habitat Connectivity Overlay Zone.

I am a professional wildlife ecologist with 30 years of experience. I also grew up in Thousand Oaks and Moorpark, and now live and work in Camarillo, so I have 50 years of roots in this County.

Maintaining our few remaining wildlife corridors is critical to having healthy wildlife populations in our local natural areas. In addition, it will help keep this County looking more like the place I grew up in, and less like Los Angeles, which is the ugliest city I have ever seen.

Conservation groups and government agencies have invested years of work and millions of dollars to maintain important wildlife corridors in the California. A network of linkages is being protected across the state. Here in Ventura places like Ahmanson Ranch and Rocky Peak Park were acquired for public recreation and to protect wildlife corridors. More recently nearly 400 acres of Alamos Canyon were acquired including a large wildlife crossing under the 118 Freeway. The result allows wildlife traveling on an existing key corridor to safely cross under the freeway. We need to protect our investment by maintaining these corridors, and we need to ensure that our open spaces and farmlands continue to allow wildlife passage between our protected areas. Wildlife movement is compatible with farms and ranching. We can ensure both will continue thrive with a common sense based solution. I believe that the proposed overlay zone is an excellent solution to the problem and does so with a light regulatory touch.

I have resided in Bell Canyon for the past 30 years. I am at a loss for polite adjectives to describe how preposterous it is to attempt to turn my community into a wildlife corridor.

Bell Canyon is a highly populated residential community that is surrounded by thousands of acres of permanent open space with long-established passageways used by wildlife to avoid contact with humans. Based on the abundance of open space surrounding Bell Canyon, the inclusion of Bell Canyon in the proposed Habitat Connectivity and Wildlife Corridor (HCWC) provides no actual benefit for wildlife or humans, rather, it <u>poses a significant danger</u> to both that will inevitably arise from contact with the thousands of residents, including a significant proportion of children, and thousands of vehicles traveling on 13 miles of roads.

The very proposal to merge a community the size of Bell Canyon with a wildlife corridor must give anyone pause. To encourage the passage of dangerous predators through our community presents a threat to the safety of its residents. The objective should be to keep wild animals separated from humans.

The proposed ordinance demonstrates a lack of proper research and forethought.
