SUBJECT: Approval of, and Authorization for the County Executive Officer or Designee to sign, a Memorandum of Agreement with the California Avocado Commission for Development and Implementation of a Polyphagous Shot Hole Borer Trapping Program; Ratification of Provision of Services Under that Agreement (4/5THS VOTE **REQUIRED FOR RECOMMENDATION NO. 3)**

RECOMMENDATIONS:

- 1. Approve, and authorize the County Executive Officer or designee to sign, the attached Memorandum of Agreement with the California Avocado Commission (MOA) for the development and implementation of a polyphagous shot hole borer (PSHB) trapping program (Exhibit 1).
- 2. Ratify the provision of services by the Agricultural Department under the MOA.
- 3. Authorize the Auditor-Controller's Office to process the necessary accounting transactions to increase revenue and appropriations as follows (REQUIRES 4/5THS VOTE):

REASON FOR RATIFICATION:

In the fiscal year 2015-2016 budget, the Agricultural Department noted that it had recently undertaken a PSHB detection and trapping program but had yet to determine the workload for that program. The California Avocado Commission is a state agency created to protect and promote California's avocado industry. The PSHB is dangerous to avocados and the California Avocado Commission agreed in principle to fund a PSHB program. To secure the benefits of early detection and the agreement discussed in this letter that might otherwise have been lost, the Agriculture Department has been implementing the PSHB program as contemplated by the parties while the parties undertook steps necessary to allow California Avocado Commission to disburse funds, including drafting and execution of the attached MOA.

This is a full cost recovery agreement with no fiscal impact.

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DISCUSSION:

The PSHB (*Euwallacea sp.*) is a very serious agricultural pest. The PSHB has a symbiotic relationship with a new species of fungi. This new species of fungi (Fusarium) has no fruiting bodies, and so far, is only known to be spread by the PSHB beetle. The PSHB carries the fungus into the plant host and feeds on the fungus. A recent discovery is that another fungus, a new Graphium spp. has been found associated with PSHB. The Fusarium grows faster than the Graphium, but both grow together. Larvae feed on the Graphium sp. but not the Fusarium. The fungus damages the vascular tissue of the tree, stopping nutrient and water flow. This stresses the tree, causing dieback and can eventually kill the entire tree.

This invasive pest attacks hundreds of different agricultural, ornamental, and wildland tree species, including avocados, oaks and sycamores. The County of Ventura is the number one avocado producing county in the nation. In 2013, Ventura County produced 113,406 tons of avocados on 20,121 acres for a value of \$209,723,000. Avocado production in Ventura County provides thousands of local jobs and a significant boost to the local economy. In 2013, avocados were the county's number two crop behind strawberries.

Under the agreement in principle, our office has collaborated with the California Avocado Commission and the University of California Cooperative Extension, in conducting a PSHB trapping program throughout the County. This program includes the placement and monitoring of traps in select sites based on established criteria and risk potential, which will serve to alert us when and where the PSHB enters the County. The PSHB has not yet been detected in Ventura County but has infested parts of neighboring Los Angeles County. In fact, in June of this year, PSHB was detected 4 to 7 miles from the county line. Early detection through the PSHB trapping program will allow us the potential to quickly take measures to slow if not stop the PSHB and to monitor any expansion of the infestation.
