The seven principles and best practices promoted by The Leave No Trace Center for Outdoor Ethics has been widely understood and adopted by many outdoor enthusiasts, non-profit organizations and government agencies to help ensure the enjoyment of the outdoors is not reduced by our own negative impacts. These Leave No Trace guidelines will teach our community how to better protect our natural surroundings, including our beaches, mountains, and open space, since many residents may not be aware or consider the outcome of decisions that can harm the natural resources in Ventura County. Becoming a Leave No Trace member will give county officials access to the Leave No Trace logos, principles, and educational information that can be used in County communications, signage and materials where warranted.
