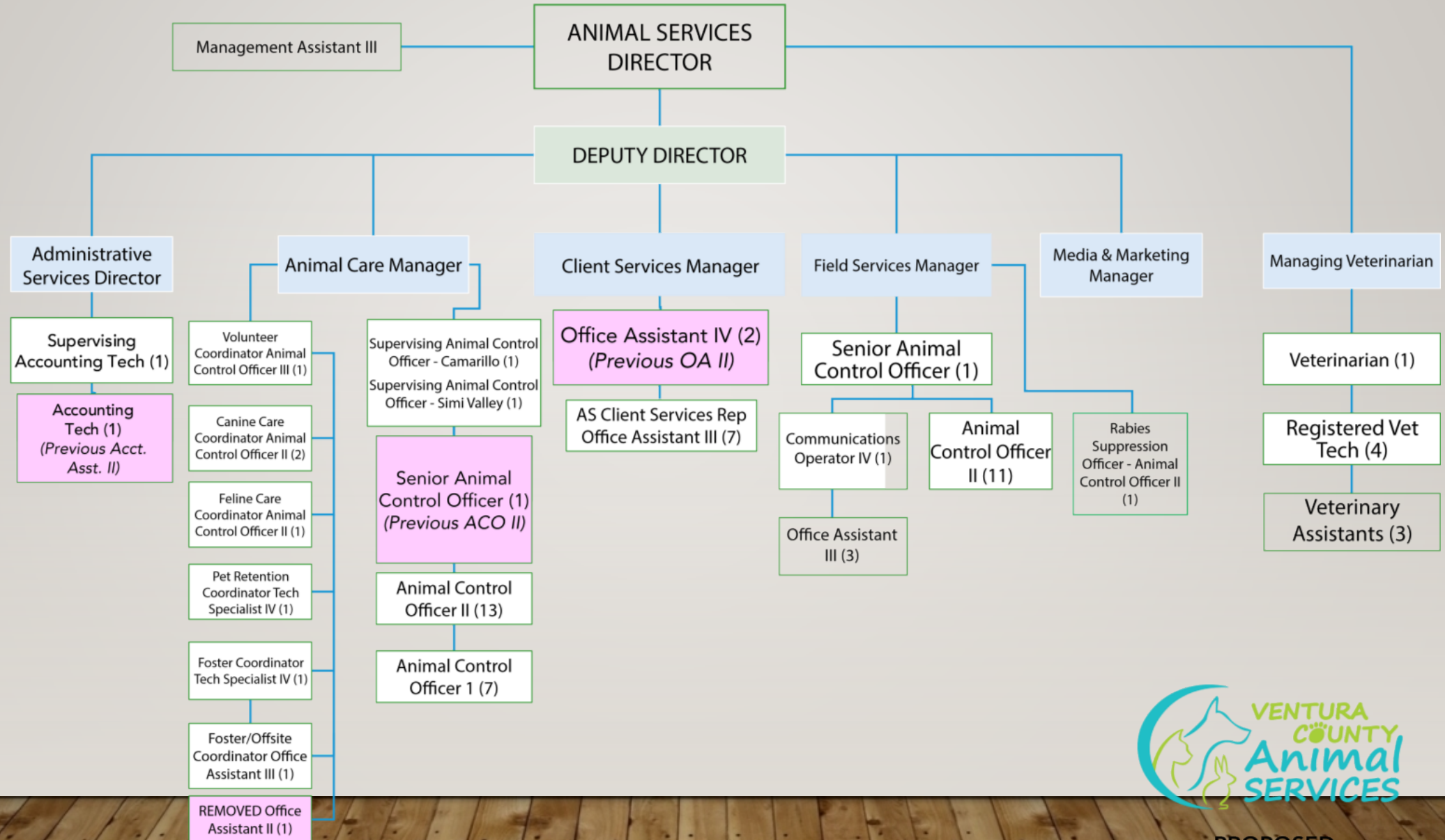
OVERVIEW

- Two Shelter Locations: Camarillo and Simi Valley
- Serve approximately 11,500 animals each year
- Provide services to Unincorporated Ventura County and eight (8) contracted cities.
 - Camarillo
 - Fillmore
 - Moorpark
 - Ojai
 - Oxnard
 - Port Hueneme
 - Simi Valley
 - Ventura
- The contracts with the eight (8) cities are projected to generate \$5,763,350 in gross billables in FY 2021-2022.
- FTE Fiscal Year 2021/2022 = 75 employees

BUDGET INFORMATION

- FY 2021/2022 Budget:
 - Expense appropriations \$9,964,866
 - Projected revenue \$6,807,227
 - Net county cost \$3,157,639 (includes services for unincorporated areas)
- 2860 Animal Services division budget is comprised of 5 budget units:
 - 2861- Administration: \$1,883,776
 - 2862- Licensing: \$ 300,899
 - 2863- Shelter: \$4,493,922
 - 2864- Veterinary Hospital: \$1,535,441
 - 2865- Field Services: \$1,750,828
- 2870 Division Budget is a Spay & Neuter budget that's offset with a Spay & Neuter subvention trust fund used for education and low cost/no cost Spay & Neuter surgeries

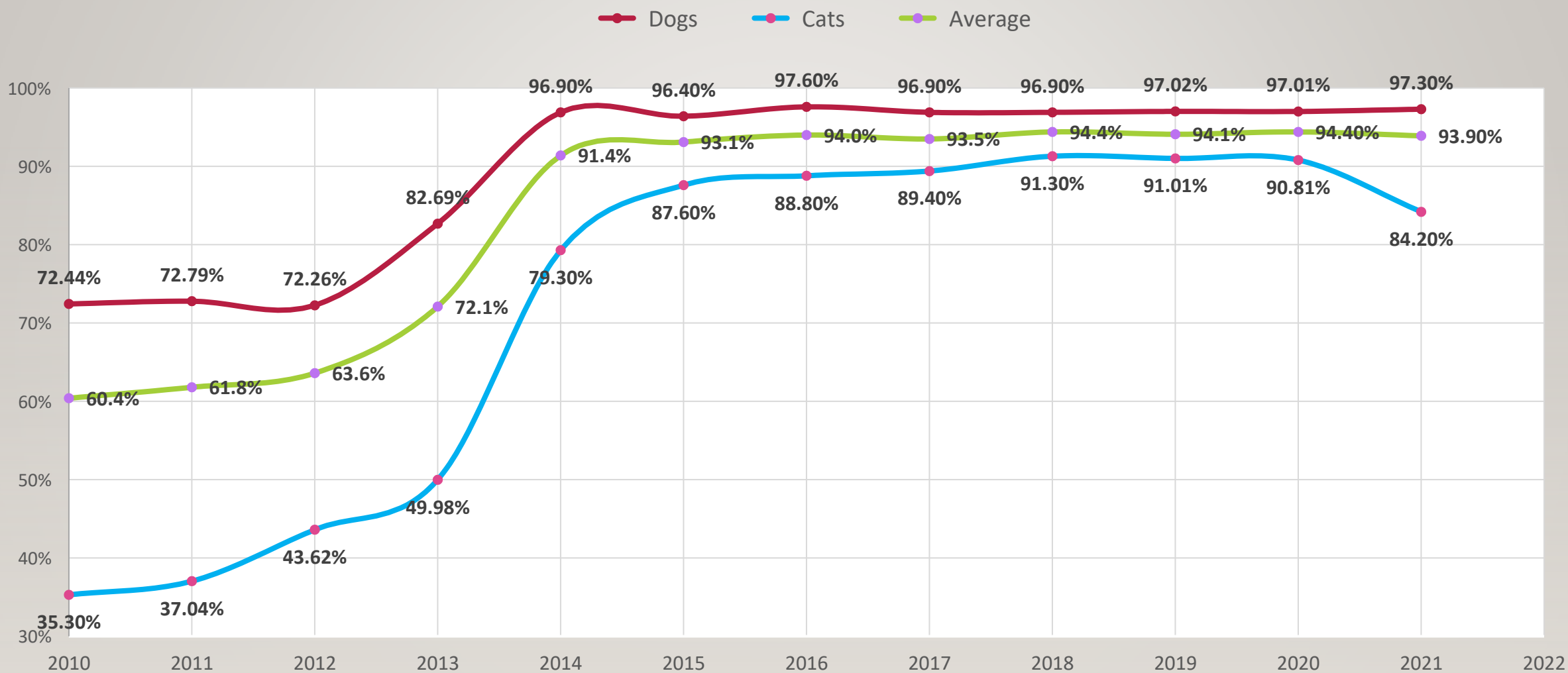

VCAS LIFESAVING TIMELINE

- In June 2012, VCAS began the journey to increase the life-release rate for animals by increasing adoption and transfer options and decreasing euthanasia due to time and space. Directed by the BOS to work towards a no-kill status (90% LRR).
- In January 2014, VCAS attained 90% LRR. Since 2014, VCAS has maintained a LRR of 90%+ for dogs and has steadily increased the LRR for cats to 90%.
- October 2019, VCAS embraced a new framework known as Socially Conscious Sheltering (SCS) to support and sustain our lifesaving efforts and clearly message our commitment to providing quality care and services to the people and animals of Ventura County.
- For calendar year 2020, VCAS maintained a 97% LRR for dogs and a 90% LRR for cats.

LIVE RELEASE RATE 2010 - 2021

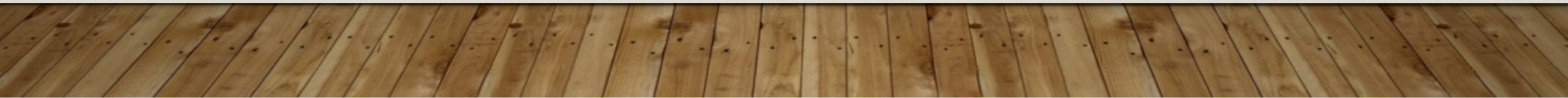


COVID-19 IMPACTS

- Temporarily Closed Simi Valley Shelter
- Restricted “walk-through visitation” at Camarillo Shelter
- Developed appointment-based adoption process
- Implemented WaitList App for enhanced customer service and social distancing
- Implemented Tele-medicine process for animals in foster care
- Installed plexiglass partitions in front lobby for infection mitigation
- Enhanced Pet Pantry Program and partnered with VCAAA for home delivery of pet food
- Modified Rabies Clinics to be held as “curbside” events
- Decrease in animals impounded to shelter
- Decrease of volunteer participation
- Decrease in Pet Licenses
- Deployed nine (approximately 12%) of employees as DSW—Average of four months.

ACCOMPLISHMENTS

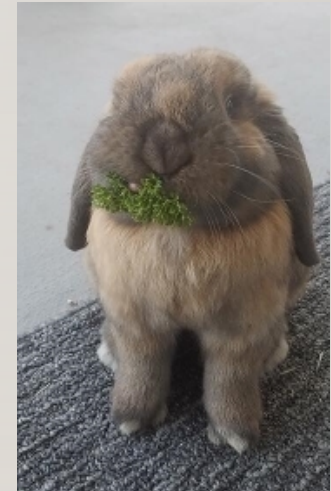
- Negotiated new five year city contracts with revised billing methodology.
- Obtained BOS approval for ordinance amendment to require veterinarians to report rabies vaccinations and implement processes.
- Launched a PetHub “smart” pet license tag.
- Launched fully redesigned website for enhanced user accessibility.
- Modified Camarillo facility to enhanced animal housing and create Adoption Counseling area.
- Installed Card Access System & Window Tinting at Camarillo Shelter.



ACCOMPLISHMENTS

- Enhanced emergency response capabilities--Emergency generator at Simi Valley Shelter, 5,000 gallon water bladder at Camarillo shelter, and additional satellite phones.
- Deployed two (2) Animal Control Officers to Butte County to assist with fire response.
- Developed and Implemented Annual Strategic Plan.
- Awarded two grants from CDFA to support Spay/Neuter activities
 - Going Home with a Cone Program--\$23,500 (300 animals)—Notice March 2021
 - Community-Based Mobile S/N Services--\$7,500 (100 animals)—Notice March 2021
- Awarded two (2) grants from PETCO Foundation (funding paid to ASFVC)
 - \$27,500--Support for Pet Retention Program to help provide for chronic veterinary care
 - \$25,000—Unrestricted Grant—Petco Love Lost Program

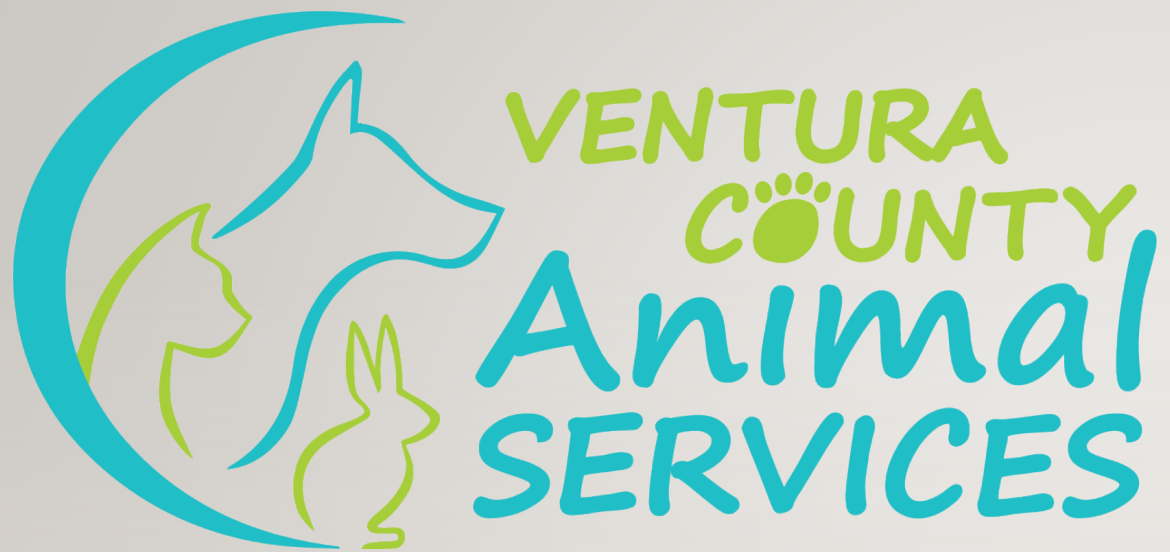

Challenge/Opportunity	Future Projects
Outdated county ordinance that governs Animal Services.	Present to BOS for public hearing on ordinance revisions.
Limited service provision to underserved/minority populations.	Evaluate services through DEI lens and adjust programming to meet needs of underserved communities.
Outdated/Overcrowded Camarillo Shelter (built in 1985) negatively impacting delivery of service and implementation of various best practice models of care.	Identify location and funding options for construction of a new shelter.
