RATIFY THE SUBMITTAL OF A GRANT FOR FUNDING OF ANGER SUBJECT: MANAGEMENT AND YOUTH VIOLENCE PREVENTION TRAINING TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE AND AND TRAINING PROJECT (FORMERLY KNOWN AS AGGRESSION REPLACEMENT TRAINING [ART] THROUGH THE CALIFORNIA DEPARTMENT OF CORRECTIONS AND REHABILITATION JUVENILE ACCOUNTABILITY BLOCK GRANTS PROGRAM (JABG)

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that your Board:

- 1. Ratify the submittal of a (JABG) Grant Application, requesting \$73,211 over a twelve-month period for funding of Anger Management and Youth Violence Prevention Training at the Juvenile Facilities (Exhibit 1).
- 2. Authorize the Chair to sign the Resolution authorizing the Chief Probation Officer to submit said application and sign the grant contract and any amendments with the Corrections Standards Authority (CSA), and assuring compliance with all grant requirements.

REASON FOR RATIFICATION:

Due to the tight submission deadline, insufficient time was available to seek Board approval prior to submission. The application was submitted electronically to CSA on June 9, 2009.

DISCUSSION:

The Probation Agency requests approval to submit a JABG Grant Application in the amount of \$73,211 over a twelve-month period to fund Anger Management and Youth Violence Prevention Training (formally known as Aggression Replacement Training [ART]) at the Juvenile Facilities. According to County procedure, if awarded the grant, the Probation Agency will return to your Board for approval to receive funds and/or sign any additional forms or agreements as may be required.

In May 2007, Governor Schwarzenegger established the California Gang Reduction, Intervention and Prevention (CalGRIP) initiative to combat gang and youth violence and created the Office of Gang and Youth Violence Policy (OGYVP) to coordinate statewide gang and youth violence reduction efforts. At the Governor's request to support the CalGRIP initiative, the State Advisory Committee on Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention (SACJJDP), which oversees the use of JABG funds, recommended to the CSA Board that \$1.1 million of federal JABG funds be used to reduce gangs and youth violence. At the recommendation of OGYVP, the SACJJDP specifically recommended that those funds support efforts to build capacity within probation departments to implement or expand the evidence-based model of aggression replacement training for juvenile offenders.

The CSA Board formed an Executive Steering Committee (ESC) to develop an application process for selecting one or more providers to deliver the aggression replacement training and technical assistance to county probation departments statewide.

The CSA staff worked with the subject matter experts on the ESC to develop a list of qualified providers who will utilize an aggression replacement training program as identified by the Model Programs Guide of the Office of Juvenile Justice Delinquency Prevention (OJJDP). Funds are to be used by probation departments to contract for services with qualified providers from this list.

This intervention is designed to alter the behavior of chronically aggressive adolescents and young children to improve social skill competence, anger control, and moral reasoning. The program incorporates three specific interventions: skill-streaming, angercontrol training, and training in moral reasoning.

The program consists of a 10-week, 30-hour intervention administered to groups of 8 to 12 juvenile offenders thrice weekly. During these 10 weeks, participating youths typically attend three one-hour sessions per week, one session each of skill-streaming, anger-control training, and training in moral reasoning. The program relies on repetitive learning techniques to teach participants to control impulsiveness and anger and use behaviors that are more appropriate. In addition, guided group discussion is used to correct antisocial thinking.

It is recommended that your Board ratify the submittal of the JABG Grant Application requesting \$73,211 over a twelve-month period and authorize the Chief Probation Officer to sign the application and related certification and assurance forms.
